
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
The world at war: How did the 'harsh provisions' of the Treaty of Versailles lead to the rise of Nazi Germany?

Background information

The inter war years (1918—1939) was supposed to be a period of peace in Europe. In retrospect, the period is often viewed as a time of revenge and harsh restriction towards Germany. The



'big 3' were adamant in punishing Germany with the Treaty of Versailles. When Hitler promised the Germans a way out of the tight grip of the Treaty, the rise of Nazi Germany began.



Secondary interpretation/ debate about period

'The treaty contained many **harsh provisions**—or so it appeared to most Germans. The German consent to it was given grudgingly and unwillingly, after a long debate whether it would not be better to refuse to sign The peace of Versailles lacked moral validity from

the start. It had to be **enforced**; it did not, as it were, enforce itself. No German accepted the treaty as a fair settlement between equals.'

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Key knowledge 1: The Treaty of Versailles

- Ww1 was ended with the signing of the treaty of Versailles in Paris 1919, however Germany were forced into signing the treaty without negotiation.
- The treaty was considered extremely harsh as it stripped vast German territory, reduced military down to 100,00 men and forced Germany to pay economy crippling reparations.
- The French and British were determined to make the treaty a harsh punishment, eventually it would lead to resentment against the 'dictated peace' forced onto German people.




Key knowledge 2: The rise of Nazi Germany


- Germany suffered 2 major economic crashes in 10 years, many turned to far left and right political parties for hope.
- Hitler's party promised to abandon the harsh treaty dictated by the 'big 3', stop paying reparations , to focus on building a financially stable Germany and the rearmament of the military.
- In 1930 Hitlers Party was the second most popular in Germany, by 1933 Hitler was elected Chancellor, the rise of the Nazis had begun

Key Knowledge 3: Life in Nazi Germany

- Although Hitler carried out his promises, censorship and propaganda helped promote extreme views of the Nazis all over Germany.
- The Hitler youth ensured younger generations were brainwashed into following Nazi ideology, meanwhile the SS were targeting any groups who did not belong in Hitlers master race.
- Women were often forced into being housewives with government incentives and propaganda to portraying expectations of women.
